

Hofmeisters selected as Grand Marshals of "Where Neighbors Become Family" Corn Festival

There's just something special about the last Saturday in September in Haxtun. The weekend marks a special celebration in which community members gather to celebrate the end of corn harvest by means of the annual Haxtun Corn Festival. For Steve and Nora Hofmeister there have been many memorable Corn Festival celebrations throughout the years, but for the long-time Haxtun couple, two stand out significantly; Corn Festival of 1977 and Corn Festival 2023.

A late Saturday in September 1977 marked the 56th annual Corn Festival celebration in downtown Haxtun. Then, a 22-year-old Steve had finished his time at Northeastern Junior College and returned to Haxtun to help on the family farm. Meanwhile, Nora, a 21-yearold Fleming native, was working at a bank in Sterling. A mutual friend of Steve and Nora's introduced the two at the annual Corn Festival celebration that fall of 1977 and as fate would have it, that friend's hunch to pair the two was right. A year later, Steve and Nora were married at St. Peter's Catholic Church south of Fleming.


Now, as the Hofmeister family has grown to include four children and 11 grandchildren, the Hofmeisters will be honored as the 2023 Haxtun Corn Festival Grand Marshals – a longstanding honor for those who have made a lasting impact on the Haxtun community.


Steve was born in Riverside, Calif. where his father served in the Air Force. While he was still an infant, the Hofmeisters returned to the Haxtun area to farm. Later, Steve graduated from Haxtun High School with the Class of 1973. After high school, he attended NJC and served as a State FFA officer before planting his roots in Haxtun and soon after met Nora.

Nora grew up in Fleming where she attended Catholic school through the sixth grade. She graduated from Fleming High School in 1974 and furthered her education in Colorado Springs. Nora went to work for Security State Bank in Sterling, now known as Wells Fargo, where she worked when she met Steve in Haxtun that Corn Festival.

Steve and Nora, both the oldest of their families, started a family of their own in 1979 when the couple welcomed daughter Alicia. Krystle joined the family in 1983 and in 1985, Steve and Nora welcomed twin boys, Russell and Travis, completing the Hofmeister family.

In 1988, the Hofmeisters started an insurance agency, first operating out of their home northeast of Haxtun. A year later, Steve and Nora needed more room for the Hofmeister Insurance Agency and re-located their office to downtown Haxtun. In the early 2000s, the Hofmeisters moved their business a block south to its current location, now operated

The annual Haxtun Corn Festival is slated for the last Saturday in September in downtown Haxtun. This year's event will take place on Sept. 30 and honor Grand Marshals Steve and Nora Hofmeister. This year's theme is "Where neighbors become family."

The Haxtun Corn Festival, sponsored each year by the Haxtun Chamber of Commerce, opens again this year with the Haxtun Volunteer Fireman's pancake breakfast at the fire hall at the corner of North Colorado Avenue and Storhm Street. Serving begins at 7 a.m.

The annual J. Jeffryes Memorial run/walk lines up at 8 a.m. along Colorado Avenue. This event raises money for scholarships awarded each year to two graduating seniors of Haxtun High School. Organizers announce winners of the run at 8:30 a.m. on the main stage.

Also at 8:30 a.m., line up for the parade begins in the elementary grade school parking lot on North Colorado Avenue. Participants can register for the parade at the Haxtun Community Center. Float judging takes place at 9:15 a.m.

The Kiddie Parade will kick off the 102nd annual Haxtun Corn Festival parade at 9:45 a.m. followed by the parade at 10 a.m. Kiddie Parade line up occurs at the Berean Bible Church in the north parking lot.

Other events and activities throughout the day include Lil' Mr.

and Miss Corn Festival Contest, valve cover races, FFA member auction, Johnny Miller Memorial Tractor Pull, High Plains Heritage Quilters Quilt Show, street games, Chuck Allen Memorial Crop and Garden Show, Violet Mae Anderson Memorial Flower Show, kiddie land, Haxtun High School Alumni meeting, food court, vendors and more.

The Festival will also feature a beer garden and concert featuring Shooter Jaxx and The Emmett Bower Band located in downtown Haxtun. The beer garden opens at noon and will feature music from DJ Gary Wisdom.

This year's evening entertainment begins with Shooter Jaxx on main street at 7 p.m. Gates open at 6 p.m. Tickets for performances at the 102nd annual Haxtun Corn Festival are on sale now and are available at welcometohaxtun.com as well as at the Haxtun Town Hall and the Haxtun Community Federal Credit Union. Ticket prices for the all-ages concert are \$25 during presale and \$30 day of performance.

Haxtun Volunteer Firemen set to host breakfast

For decades Corn Festival goers have started their day with pancakes, bacon and eggs at the Haxtun Fire Hall and the 102nd is no different. The Haxtun Volunteer Fireman will host their annual breakfast this year at the fire hall, located at the corner of Colorado Avenue and Strohm Street.

Each year the local fire department serves a hearty breakfast of pancakes, eggs and bacon from 7-9 a.m. This year's event is slated for Saturday, Sept. 30 in downtown Haxtun.

The breakfast is served as a freewill offering. Typically funds raised during the breakfast benefit needs of the department or other needs within the Haxtun community

Last year, funds donated at the annual breakfast were used for training and equipment needs. This includes motorcycles, four wheelers and golf carts.

Small power wheel toys are allowed to enter the Kiddie Parade.

Each participant in the Kiddie

Parade receives a ribbon and one dollar following judging.

At 8:30 am., line up for the main parade begins in the elementary grade school parking lot on North Colorado Avenue. Participants can register for the parade at the Haxtun Community Center or online at welcometohaxtun.com. Float judging takes place at 9:15 a.m. followed by the parade 10 a.m.

Shooter Jaxx to open, Emmett Bower Band to headline for festival on Sept. 30

The 2023 Haxtun Corn Festival will feature a concert as part of the 102nd celebration in downtown Haxtun. Those with energy to spare after a fun-filled day of activities can rock out to the sounds of Shooter Jaxx and the

Emmett Bower Band. The Haxtun Corn Festival street dance takes place on Sept. 30 on North Colorado Avenue in downtown Haxtun. Gates open at 6 p.m. and the opening act kicks things off at 7 p.m.

Shooter Jaxx will kick things off in downtown Haxtun on Saturday evening. The group, who formed in 2018, debuted their first album, Cabin Fever, in the spring of 2019. The Shooter Jaxx group offers a unique fusion of country and rock music. Honey Whiskey Lips, the groups newest single, released in 2021.

The Emmett Bower Band is a rock influenced alt country band from Lincoln, Neb., which originated in late October 2010.

Since the early days of the band, the music and format has constantly

evolved. Changes to the band's roster were inevitable but the current lineup consists of a tight four-piece group, creating the foundation for the group's unique sound.

Today's group is made up of Jeffrey Emmett Bower, acoustic/ electric guitar and lead vocals; Nate Keim and Issac Beihl, on guitars; Aaron Paiz, bass; and Travis Muzney, on the drums.

The Emmett Bower Band plays nearly 100 shows per year, touring the nation - even playing shows in country music strongholds like Nashville and Austin. The band has shared the stage with amazing talent, such as Randy Rogers Band, Roger Creager, Jason Boland and the Stragglers, Bart Crow, Jackson Taylor, Gloriana, Sonia Leigh, No Justice, Thomas Rhett, Jon Pardi, Frankie Ballard, Logan Mize, Casey Donahue, Aaron Watson, Whiskey Myers and many others.

The band's catalog of music currently consists of four self-produced albums under the "It's A Party Records" record label (the bands own label). Songs such as "Never Let it Go," "Single for the Summer," "The Way

She Danced," "Before She's Gone," "You Saved Me," "Chasin' the Sun," "Tumbleweed" and "Main Attraction" have been played on radio stations in Nebraska, Kansas and Tennessee in regular rotation. Their latest album was nominated for 2018 Album of the Year and Bower was nominated for Songwriter of the Year by the Rocky Mountain Country Music Awards.

In Nebraska, Emmett Bower Band songs can regularly be heard on stations such as Y102, 103.9 KNLV, US92, 104.9 The Max, 93.1 the River and KBEAR Country. Possessing a wealth of stage experience and a deep catalog of music, the four members have honed their live performance to accommodate larger venues, dance halls, street dances, rodeos, weddings and festivals. The band takes pride in writing original music their own way.



Haxtun FFA Chapter to hold annual fundraising auction at Corn Festival

Going once, going twice, sold! The annual Haxtun FFA member auction is set to take place on Saturday, Sept. 30. The auction takes place on the main stage downtown Haxtun following the parade and Lil' Mr. and Miss Corn Festival contest, around 12 noon. The sale offers the opportunity for locals to purchase labor by Haxtun High School FFA members. Those who win the bid receive a commitment of eight hours of labor from the student purchased. All bid prices are per hour. FFA advisor Jeff Plumb, who oversees the event each year, said the students appreciate those who continue to support the program in this way and noted that bidders are welcome to partner with each other to purchase a worker.

"Splitting a worker's time between

two bidders is perfectly fine," he said, adding that there are 75 students signed up for FFA this year. "So, it really adds up when you start paying for that many kids to participate in everything that goes on."

The money raised helps pay for students to attend State and National conventions and other activities throughout the year. Years when the auctions are exceptionally successful, the local FFA uses any excess with a fund established to assist families facing financial crisis. Typically the annual FFA auction brings in roughly \$25,000.

The auction is the only fundraiser the Haxtun FFA members conduct throughout the year. FFA members also help sponsor service activities throughout the community.





Every Friday morning prior to Corn Festival, Steve and Nora host the entire Lions Club member base for coffee and donuts after the group sets up the hamburger stand; a tradition they've carried on for over 30 years. And then Saturday, Steve and Nora can be found doing their part to help the stand run smoothly. On Saturday, Sept. 30 when the community comes together to celebrate, the Hofmeisters will lead the 102nd Corn Festival parade and as requested, close by will be Steve's class of 1973 as the group plans to celebrate their 50th class reunion, hosted by the Hofmeisters.

"We are so blessed to have the quality of life we have here," Nora said. "Our doctors and hospital are amazing, if we didn't have them our little town would not be. Our school is second to none. The teachers and staff really, genuinely care for our kids. They promote a safe and healthy environment for learning. The community supports our students in every aspect of their lives. We need to all count our blessings for our town and community."
